There have been several inquiries as to the location of Washington park. It was known prior to the war as Schiller park. Before that it was City park and there are many who will attend who will remember it as Stewart's grove, its name in the early history of Columbus. It is bounded by City Park, Deshler and Stewart avenues and by Jaeger street, and is one block east of High street. It can be reached by three street car lines, the Steelton, South High street and High and Whittier, all of which pass within a block of it and on all of which there will be tripper service Thursday evening to accommodate the crowds who will be on hand. Ample parking space will be offered on the streets which lead up to the park also, so that the matter of getting to the park and of parking automobiles while there will be a very simple one. No automobiles will be permitted in the park, however.

Activities at the lawn fete will begin shortly before 8 o'clock. Immediately after the arrival of the parade of the Johns and Bills, bands and choruses police and city officials and the general committee, which is scheduled to leave the statehouse at 7 p. m. and proceed south on High street to Stewart avenue and east to the park. Eddie Conrad, manager of the Field Minstrel band, has arranged to have that organization in the stand at the west front of the shelter house at 7 p. m. to play for the entertainment of the crowds which arrive before the parade comes. It would be well for those who attend to make sure of seeing the parade, however, for it will be an important part of the lawn fete entertainment.

BANDS WILL PLAY.

The Shrine band, chorus and patrol will occupy a stand in the northwest section of the park, where there is an open space well adapted for the exhibition drill to be put on by the patrol, an unusual feature which will be more than worth the price of admission itself. An especially large stand is being erected to accommodate these three Aladdin temple organizations. The Dokkie band will play from a stand in the northeast section of the park, where the United German Singing societies will also hold forth. The Federation of Musicians' band will play from the band stand in the southwest section of the park, where the Republican Glee club will also sing. Pianos have been obtained for each of the four stands, in order to accompany the singers.

This arrangement has been made so that there will be entertainment for those in all sections of the park or for those who park their machines outside on any of the streets surrounding the park.

Residents of the Home for the Aged, who have been making a quilt which will be auctioned off at the lawn fete by Postmaster S. A. Kinnear, will be taken to the lawn fete in automobiles furnished by the Columbus Automobile club. Postmaster Kinnear, who will also auction five tons of coal contributed by the McIntyre Co., is not the only auctioneer who will be on hand. County Auditor H. Sage Valentine will also appear in this role when he sells a baby carriage robe made by his wife, who is visiting in Pennsylvania, and sent to her husband, one of the most active workers in plans for the lawn fete. The robe is a beautiful hand-embroidered one and some young mother is going to be delighted with it.

JAMES ROTHSCHILD IS SUED BY FRENCH GIRL

Denies Charge That Woman Came to New York on His Promise to Marry Her.

NEW YORK, JULY 26.—Baron James De Rothschild, a member of the famous Rothschild family of France, was sued for \$500,000 damages in state supreme court today by Marie Porquet, a French girl, who alleged she came here last spring on his promise to marry her and that he has since refused to fix a date for the marriage.

A statement issued by the baron's counsel, Edgar T. Brackett, declared the French nobleman "denies most strenuously the statements of the plaintiff, and says that the claim that he ever promised or contemplated marrying her is absurd and without the slightest foundation." The baron now is in Paris. The complaint was served on him here at 375 Park avenue, June 27.
